### We Welcome this month's speaker, Gary Meyer

Gary's interest in orchids began when he was a freshman in high school in Michigan. He had already replaced much of his dad's beloved lawn with hundreds of perennials and North American native plants, partly in an attempt (futile, unfortunately) to attract hummingbirds. Among this plant collection were several Cypripedium species, which ignited his curiosity about orchids from other parts of the globe. He found a photograph of Masdevallia vietchiana in a library book that rendered him helpless to resist the pull to Pleurothallids. Shortly thereafter, he laid eyes on a line drawing of Dracula chimaera in a J & L Orchids catalog, and has been enslaved by Draculas ever since.

Gary started growing Draculas in his parents' basement in 1990, with some degree of success. However, college, then medical school, and finally graduate school became unavoidable distractions for him. By The time he finished his Ph.D. in Neuroscience in 2004, he thought he had managed to completely kick the orchid addiction.



In February, 2003, Gary moved to San Francisco, and within two weeks of his arrival, found himself face to face with a pure yellow Dracula gorgona xanthina (owned by John Leathers) at the Pacific Orchid Exposition. The addiction was immediately revived, stronger than ever. Six years later, Gary now has two overcrowded greenhouses in his backyard in San Francisco and several hundred Dracula plants (along with a reasonable dose Masdevallias, Lepanthes, and Anguloas).

In 2005, Gary attended the first Scientific Conference on Andean Orchids, held at Ecuagenera's facilities in Gualaceo, Ecuador. There, he met Ken Cameron, Ph.D., then the director of the molecular taxonomy program at the New York Botanical Garden. Given Gary's access to most of the Dracula species and variations currently in cultivation and his laboratory science background, Ken suggested they together take on the task of investigating the taxonomy of Dracula through molecular technologies. Gary spent the summer of 2006, and occasional weeks thereafter, in Ken's lab at the New York Botanical Garden and his new facility at the University of Wisconsin, isolating and studying the DNA of more than 200 Dracula specimens. The initial results from this work were presented at the Second Scientific Conference on Andean Orchids in 2007, held in Loja, Ecuador.

Gary has been travelling to Colombia and Ecuador once or twice a year since 2005 to observe Draculas in the wild and visit collections of South American Dracula growers. His talk today will cover a variety of topics, including the current state of Draculas in nature, cultural cues from the environment, and new insights from his laboratory research.

### Orchid Portraits

Artist Sally Robertson transforms orchids into works of art

Saltending a show at the Bolinas Museum in the San Francisco Bay Area in 1991. I had heard that she was an accomplished watercolor painter, well known for her work with iris, roses and other garden flowers. There was a painting of Rhododendron catawbiense grandiflorum and I remember standing in front of it, impressed by its strength and the quality of the color, thinking I must introduce this woman to orchids.

It was another year before Sally finally made it over to our annual autumn sale and saw the orchid that changed her life. We had lots of great orchids in flower that year but the one that caught her eye that day was a large flowering specimen of Laelia perrinii. I remember Sally's eyes closing down a little in concentration as she held up her fingers to form a frame moving over the flowers and the pseudobulbs. She began stopping by every week to see what was in flower and, in her own

words, became obsessed. Her first exhibition of orchid paintings took place the following spring at her San Francisco gallery with 27 works exhibited. It was a great success.

Sally has brought a wealth of art education and painting experience to orchids. She holds an Master of Arts in the History of Art from the University of California at Berkeley and was a highly respected gallery owner dealing in 19thand 20th-century works on paper for 20 years in San Francisco. She has been painting flower subjects for more than 12 years and portrays the singular power and



strength of the orchids in a truly expressive manner.

It is a great pleasure to have an artist of Sally's caliber come into the greenhouse to look for inspiration in the great variety and liveliness of the plants. One especially interesting aspect of Sally's



work that I have come to really enjoy is her treatment of the vegetative aspects of the plants. It is not just the flowers but also the shapes and textures of the pseudobulbs, leaves and roots that fascinate her.

Orchid enthusiasts from the San Francisco Bay Area know her work as an ex-

She placed five 5-foot-wide watercolors in the amazing rainforest exhibit for 1996 "Gardens in the Rain" entrance, and more recently her rendering of Cattleya Mem. Helen Brown 'Sweet Afton', AM/AOS, in the Deco style, was reprinted as the perfect poster to advertise the 1998 "Orchids Go Art Deco" exhibition.

Sally Robertson has shown great enthusiasm for these shows and has donated much time and skill working with the organizers. We are lucky to have such a talented, generous artist in our midst.

### What the Artist Says

I use Arches Cold Press watercolor paper, in both 140 pound and 300 pound, or the equivalent weight in larger sizes. I usually recommend the 140 pound to my students, as it encourages the spontaneity and magic qualities of watercolor, but I find myself using the heavier paper for my finished work.

My paints of choice are Winsor and Newton tube watercolors, with the occasional addition of colors offered by Daniel Smith.

I use fine sable brushes (Winsor and Newton Series 7), and usually have at least three in my hand at one time. But I also recommend the all-synthetic white sable to my students as an affordable and quite-satisfactory alternative.

Of the many how-to books on watercolor I own, the only one I can recommend with enthusiasm is *The Art of Watercolor*, by Charles LeClair.

As far as rendering orchids, they are better models than most garden flowers, in that they hold their pose (unlike a rose, for example, which can lose its petals before your eyes). However, orchids present a separate set of challenges: the symmetry of form, the strange and fascinating arrangements of roots and pseudobulbs, and trying to place plants grown in pots in a natural setting are among my concerns when confronting an orchid. — Sally Robertson, PO Box 373, Bolinas, California 94924 (e-mail sallystudio@earthlink.net).
