'Tis the Season

It's always surprising to me how quickly Spring sneaks up on us in New England. One minute there's a pile of snow at the end of the driveway and the next, the lump has transformed into dandelions and a lawn that needs to be cut. At least that's the way it is at my house. So, I thought I'd transcribe a few ideas about how I manage the change of seasons with my collection.

The sun is a lot higher in the sky than it was just before Christmas. Those windowsill plants that were gasping for every photon of light are now on the verge of being fried. Bare windows worked all winter long but it's time to add a sheer curtain or adjust the plants so they're a little further away from the bare panes. If the greenhouse growers haven't added additional shade cloth or paint on shading, NOW"S THE TIME!

I know we've heard it so many times before, but the surface of the leaves of our orchids really do get warm to the touch when they're getting too much light. The best way to tell where you're at with your plant's light requirements is to use a light meter. I'm told there's an APP for that though as everyone out there knows, I'm as old school as it gets, and my light meter is never that far away. I'm pretty good about lending it out too - you just need to come to Pepperell to borrow it. Point is - it's getting bright out and be careful that you do not burn your plants - this is the time of year when it happens.

But to the meat of the matter and the purpose of this rant: with Spring comes the first opportunities to get our plants outside. This can be a blessing as well as a curse with our New England Springs. It can be perfect weather for our cool growing plants for weeks at a time and then all of the sudden, there's six inches of wet/heavy snow trying to break the backs of everything we have out. My recommendation is to put your plants out as soon as possible but keep a weather (sailing term) and be ready to move everything in at a moment's notice., Standard cymbidiums are the first to go out and for good reason. The sooner you can get this season's growth going the sooner it'll be finished. Pushing the Cyms now means more blooms in the fall and winter. If you want your plant to look its best, the effort starts now.

Your Masdevallias, cool growing Dendrobiums, and Odontoglossum hybrids are the next to migrate. All can take nights in the 40s and some can take a light frost as long as they're on the dry side when it happens.

While the Cymbidiums will be able to take the full sun after a short transition period of light shading, the rest of the plants may need a longer hardening-off period before the unfettered rays of the Sun can do their work. I like to use the 4" plastic lattice that you can get at the big home improvement stores to provide my shade. This setup seems to let just enough light in to keep everyone happy.

By mid-June, everything can be out except the warmest of growers. If you have questions about a particular plant - please ask. If I do not have experience with the genera in question, I'm sure I know someone who does.

And one last thought:

It's time to repot any plants that are due and if there was ever a time to get serious about properly fertilizing your plants - this is it. Good growing conditions only equate to great plants if all their other needs are being met... but that's an article for another time.




