May Growers Forum!

The Program

We hope you can join us at our May 8th meeting program, featuring the long-awaited Growers Forum. Three MOS members will lead 20-minute segments of different growing styles: Windowsills, under lights and growing in a terrarium. In each case, a 10-15 minute talk will be followed by 5-10 minutes of interactive discussion and questions.

The proposed discussions and their leaders will be as follows:

<u>Mike Badia</u> – Mike brings extensive experience and success growing award winning plants on windowsills. He also is an experienced grower under lights, and currently is completing the construction of a growing room in his basement. For this program he will focus on windowsill growing.


<u>Linda Abrams</u> – Another excellent grower, Linda is very successful under lights, and has been for a long time. She grows several alliances with diverse cultures under lights. Her growing room, which she calls primitive, has different lighting conditions based upon her plants needs. A long time member of MOS, Linda ran the MOS show table for 20 years. Linda will focus her talk on her different lighting and growing conditions.

<u>Sasha Crotty</u> – An extremely knowledgeable orchid grower, Sasha (a former MOS President) has conquered the challenge of space limitations in a townhouse. Her 200+ plants attest to her ingenuity and commitment to succeed. Sasha focuses on smaller (and often lesser known orchids) and grows in terrariums. She creates growing environments consistent with the culture requirements of her orchids and has extensive success with her plants. She controls temperature, air movement, humidity and light in the terrarium. This will be an excellent opportunity to gain insight into a growing style that too few of us are familiar with!


Dear Members,

GROW AND SHOW!





May's Grow And Show features your newsletter editor! If we haven't already met, my name is Anne Pfaff and I re-joined MOS two years ago, after a 20+year hiatus, to focus on my art career and raising kids. I grow my orchids indoors from October until May, but during the warm months they camp out in our backyard, where they enjoy sun and shade provided by my neighbor's enormous oak trees.

There is a 10 x 10' room in the basement of our Victorian home that was once the maid's washroom. Aside from three enormous soapstone sinks that no one ever bothered to remove (they weigh a ton) the room has been empty and unused until about 10 years ago, when I started collecting again. I needed space and this room seemed perfect. The old, rotting plaster walls and ceiling were replaced with Wonder Board –a product that stands up to high humidity. New windows that can be opened replaced the old ones and a plumber reconnected the drain and faucets. I installed hanging ballasts for the T5 lights. I bought light timers, plastic shelving units and two oscillating fans, plus a 9 gallon Lasko humidifier, all from Home Depot. I lined the walls with kitchen shelf liner to protect from splashing water and laid a scrap of linoleum on the floor, too.

The nice thing about basement growing is being able to regulate temperatures by simply opening the door and windows. T5 lights generate a lot of heat, which is a constant problem. Another basement advantage; light timers can be set to regulate shorter or longer day lengths, to simulate growth and rest seasons. My hose has an adjustable head which can be set to mist or shower. The runoff goes either down the sink drains or into deep trays that drain into buckets. To fertilize, I use a pressurized garden sprayer, also from HD.

Small pots lay on fluorescent light covers for extra stability. In the foreground, a recently divided Catt. Walkeriana mounted on pieces of the remains of a cholla cactus that I recently found in the desert in Arizona.


